### Outdoor interpretive displays describe the important history of the Millville Army Air Field during World War II

A visit to the Millville Army Air Field Museum (MAAFM) at Millville Executive Airport includes seeing a number of large outdoor murals that tell visually some of the important history that took place here during World War II. Now, added to the visuals are interpretive displays that describe these murals in detail.

The MAAFM unveiled three outdoor interpretive displays at their 20th annual Veterans Appreciation Day that was held on November 6, 2021, in the museum's historic courtyard.

"The museum is extremely proud to be able to recognize the World War II history that took place here at Millville Executive Airport," says Lisa Jester, MAAFM executive director. "Our largest collections of artifacts are displayed in the former base headquarters building, but each of the buildings in the historic district was significant. 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# History made at the Millville Army Air Field Museum...

# 77 years after liberation of Buchenwald, Holocaust survivor, 91, and US Army medic, 100, meet formally for first time.

Both were at the Buchenwald Concentration Camp in Spring 1945.

On August 31, the Millville Army Air Field Museum (MAAFM) hosted a rare and historic meeting between a 91-year-old Buchenwald concentration camp survivor and a 100-year-old World War II US Army medic who treated prisoners at Buchenwald when the camp was liberated by US Army forces.

The MAAFM collaborated with the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington, DC, to arrange a virtual get-together between Steven Fenves, a Holocaust survivor who was at Buchenwald, and MAAFM member and volunteer Tim Kiniry — 77 years after they were at the camp at the same time.

Kiniry and Fenves met for a conversation, via Zoom, in the MAAFM's main conference room, located in the historic World War II base headquarters building. A reception followed with guests attending.

Buchenwald was a Nazi concentration camp located near Weimar, Germany. It was one of the largest concentration camps in Germany and included more than 130 subcamps. The Nazis imprisoned a variety of people in Buchenwald; among them were political opponents, Jews, and prisoners from Nazi-occupied Europe. The camp inmates had to perform forced labor, working primarily in local armament factories. Insufficient food and poor conditions, as well as deliberate executions, led to more than 56,000 deaths of the 250,000 prisoners who passed through the Buchenwald camp system.

Fenves was deported, along with his family, to the Auschwitz-Birkenau killing center in 1944. At the age of 13, he joined the camp resistance, served as an interpreter for Polish political prisoners and was smuggled onto a transport to a Buchenwald sub-

camp, where he spent six months as a forced laborer working on the assembly line in a Junkers aircraft factory. He was sent on a death march to the main camp and liberated from Buchenwald by American soldiers on April 11, 1945.

Kiniry served in the US Army from 1942 to 1945 with the 45th Evacuation Hospital attached to the First Army and then later the Third Army at the end of the war. He was a medic at the Battle of the Bulge and at other European Theatre battles where his group treated thousands of soldiers in field hospitals located just behind battle lines. His unit set up operations inside the Buchenwald concentration camp for two weeks after it was liberated, treating gravely ill prisoners and saving numerous lives. Kiniry has, in previous interviews with Millville High School students at the museum, described the horrific conditions in the camp and praised the valiant efforts that were made at that time.

"Tim Kiniry recently said that he wished he had the opportunity to meet a Buchenwald survivor once again," explains Bob Trivellini, MAAFM vice president. "With that incentive, we reached out to the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum in search of a Holocaust survivor who was imprisoned at Buchenwald in April 1945."

The conversation was genuine, interesting and informative, as each man described conditions and locations that were part of their experiences at

Buchenwald. The film crew from the US Holocaust Memorial Museum, and one from the MAAFM, videotaped all of the conversation that documented information about conditions at the concentration camp at the end of the war. We were pleased to also have Philadelphia Channel 6ABC News there to report on this historic event.

The MAAFM thanks Diane Saltzman, Director of Constituency Engagement at the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum, who helped make this opportunity become a reality. She said, "These two gentlemen have shared their stories with countless audiences, testifying to the truth of what they experienced and witnessed. It's an honor to help bring them together."

The MAAFM also thanks museum advisory board member Richard Walzak for initiating the connection with the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum.

"This was a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity," notes Trivellini. "As a museum preserving World War II history, the MAAFM was thrilled to make this meeting happen. These two men offered details about the liberation of Buchenwald and the treatment of prisoners that are unique and possibly undocumented."

various jobs before heading overseas to defend our country's freedom.

"Our outdoor murals, with their recently installed interpretive displays, tell valuable histories," continues Jester. "Probably our most important historic artifact is the museum's operational Link Trainer flight simulator which is kept in the original World War II Link Trainer Building. Visitors can learn more about this premier equipment that was used for more than 30 years for instrument flight instruction by seeing the mural and reading its interpretive display — even when the museum is closed."

Two additional interpretive displays include one in front of the mural that honors the Millville Fire Department and its important role at the

Millville Army Air Field during World War II, and another alongside of a mural entitled *Gunnery Practice over the Atlantic*, on historic Building 31. This mural features a huge rendering of a B-26 Martin Marauder and describes the type of air-to-air gunnery training that took place at Millville during the war.

"We were very fortunate to have World War II veterans George Washington Whitehouse who flew the Marauders at Millville and Charles Osborne who flew P-47 Thunderbolts attend the mural unveiling in November 2020," points out Jester. "These two veterans of Millville Army Air Field gave their input into the creation of the gunnery practice mural and are noted in the text of its interpretive display."

The MAAFM murals were designed and produced by Sam Donovan, mural artist, from Woodstown, NJ, who also created the *Wall of Remembrance Mural* on Millville City Hall and several other murals located in the historic complex of the museum at Millville Executive Airport, each documenting a specific aspect of the World War II history of the Millville Army Air Field — America's First Defense Airport.

Funding for the new displays was made possible in part by the New Jersey State Council on the Arts/Department of State, the National Endowment for the Arts, and the Cumberland County Board of Commissioners through the Cumberland County Cultural & Heritage Commission (CCCHC).

"We sincerely thank the CCCHC for their continued support for historic preservation at the airport," notes Jester. "In addition, the MAAFM thanks Brian Gifford, a member and friend of the museum, for his assistance in installing the interpretive displays.

### Millville Army Air Field Museum adds M60A3 tank to its military artifact collection

Our museum recently acquired a United States Army 1960s-era tank to display in our historic courtyard! This very exciting acquisition came to us from the VFW 8838 chapter in Roebling, NJ.

The M60 is an American second-generation main battle tank (MBT). It was officially standardized as Tank, Combat, Full Tracked: 105mm Gun, M60, in March 1959. Although developed from the M48 Patton, the M60 tank series was never officially christened as a Patton tank. The US Army considered it a "product-improved descendant" of the Patton tank's design, so it is sometimes informally grouped as a member of the Patton tank family.

The United States fully committed to the MBT doctrine in 1963, when the Marine Corps retired the last (M103) heavy tank battalion. The M60 tank series became America's primary main battle tank during the Cold War, reaching a production total of 15,000 M60s. Hull production ended in 1983, but 5,400 older models were converted to the M60A3 variant ending in 1990.

The United States' largest deployment of M60s was in the 1991 Gulf War, where the US Marines equipped with M60A1s effectively defeated Iraqi armored forces, including T-72 tanks. The United States retired the M60 from front-line combat after Operation Desert Storm, with the last tanks being retired from National Guard service in 1997. (Wikipedia)



Although not yet in its permanent display location at the Millville Executive Airport, the M60 was transported from Roebling to Vineland, NJ, through the generosity of Northeast Precast by Garton's Rigging, Inc. The tank weighs more than 50 tons. It is currently and temporarily located at Northeast Precast where they are donating the prep work of sandblasting, welding and painting. So many thank yous go to John Ruga, owner of Northeast Precast, and his crew of assistants for their generous donations of time and talent.

### MAAFM World War II lecture series held at the Wyble Museum

The Millville Army Air Field Museum was very proud to present a free lecture series on World War II focused on the European Theatre of Operations (ETO), highlighting less frequently covered topics of the war.

The lectures were held biweekly on Saturdays from January through May 2022 in the Henry E. Wyble Historic Research Library and Education Center, which is located at 23 Peterson Street, Millville Executive Airport, Millville, NJ, on the campus of the Millville Army Air Field Museum.

The lecture series was presented by Ralph H. Thomas, local amateur World War II historian and author of the book WWII: 50 Objects That Helped Win The War and The Companies That Made Them.

Topics ranged from the *Rise of the Third Reich* to the *U.S. Home Front*, to *Allied Secret Operations*. The lectures were interesting and informative. Ralph is planning to hold another lecture series in 2024.

### **Veteran Interview Project marches forward**

The Veteran Interview Project, a partnership between the MAAFM and the Millville Public Schools, continues to expose many students to the amazing opportunity to meet and ask questions of World War II veterans. Due to COVID and the distance some of the veterans live, a number of interviews were done virtually to keep this important initiative going strong. Among those were Rocky Gannon, Charles Osborne, George Rubin, and Tim Kiniry. Gannon was a B-17 pilot during World War II, then flew for 18 months in Korea, during the Belgian Congo War, and a remarkable 387 missions in Vietnam. After 37 years of service, he retired from the Air Force with more than 6,000 hours in 34 different types of aircraft.

96-year-old Navy veteran John Quinesso, pictured far right being interviewed by Millville High School freshman Leighanna Teti, was interviewed twice by Millville High students. He was a Radioman on the Landing Ship LSM-302 that shuttled men, tanks, aviation fuel and supplies to Pacific island battle sites during World War II. He received the exciting message that World War II was over and notified the Captain.

### Museum's World War II-era C-3 Link Trainer restoration completed by dedicated volunteers

A full cosmetic restoration of the museum's original World War II-era C-3 Link Trainer was completed in April 2022 by a group of dedicated volunteers. Ed Possenti, Jim Crispo and Ed Cox began the project in January 2022 when they discovered many of the component parts for the Link stored away in Building 31.

While the C-3 is not restored to operational, all of the components are now in place and historically correct. This WWII-era Link is on display next to the museum's C-8 fully operational 1950s-era Link in the original Millville Air Base Link Trainer building that is part of the Millville Executive Airport's historic district.

These Link Trainers, flight simulators that were used from the 1920s through the early 1950s, were the only pieces of apparatus used to teach pilots how to fly under poor visibility conditions. There are just a handful of them left in the world. The museum is very fortunate to have two WWII-era and one 1950s-era Links.

The restoration of the C-3 Link Trainer included repair and/or replacement of the wings, canopy, rudder and rear stabilizer. Some pieces had to be totally re-fabricated such as metal parts, brackets and braces. In addition, a new step up was fabricated from aluminum diamond plate, to assist with viewing the inside of the cockpit.

In the cockpit, the throttle was rebuilt and installed and a museum mannequin is seated wearing an authentic US Army Air Corps shirt with brass tabs on the shoulders that belonged to Ed Possenti's father, who served during WWII.

The volunteers used online photos and information from universities and other museums to insure historic authenticity wherever possible.

As a supplement to the C-3 restoration, two showcases were set up with additional parts, pictures and informational pieces that further explain how the Link Trainers operated.

The highly acclaimed Lockheed Martin **USAF F-22 Raptor** — the most dominant and advanced air superiority fighter in the world — presented a "loud, fast and powerful" demonstration of modern American air power.

The **US** Army Golden Knights — the official 18-person parachute team of the United States Army — performed twice daily during the two-day airshow. The **Knights** jumped from 13,000 feet above the airport, traveling nearly 120 miles per hour and landing with pin-point precision.

"We had a very exciting Millville Wheels & Wings Airshow 2021," said Jerry Carey, MAAFM president. "The weather cooperated and the museum was honored to host another outstanding community event that showcased the fastest, loudest military jets, rare historic warbirds and a list of aviation performers.

"It was a fun-filled family day, with five hours of aerial performances, dozens of static aircraft and hundreds of classic cars on the ground, great food, vendor displays, bouncies for the kids, and of course, many visits to the museum, where the important WWII history of Millville Airport is preserved for future generations. This year we celebrated the 80th anniversary of the Millville Army Air Field — America's First Defense Airport — which was dedicated on August 2, 1941.

"On behalf of the museum, I thank our volunteer committee, headed up by Lisa Jester, airshow director, along with many community-minded individuals and sponsors who assisted in making the Millville Wheels & Wings Airshow 2021 such a success," noted Carey.



### **PROFILES IN SERVICE**

### The Cox Family—three generations of U.S. Navy veterans... and more!

The Millville Army Air Field Museum is proud to have solid connections to the Cox family of Millville, NJ—a family that has given selflessly of their lives serving our country with pride and dedication.

Ed Cox, a volunteer at the MAAFM, his father Jack Cox and son Ed Cox Jr. all served in the U.S. Navy, and there are others!

#### Seaman 1st Class John E. Cox

Let's begin with Jack Cox, who left high school to enlist in the U.S. Navy in February 1944. Jack had two older brothers who were serving in the



U.S. Army at that time and one younger brother who served later in Korea in the National Guard.

John E. (Jack) Cox served from 1944 to 1946 on the USS LCSL III, a landing craft support ship that was commissioned in 1945. Notes son Ed about the LCSL III, "The U.S. built 130 of these boats during WWII, pumping out one every 29 days, a great achievement and a great amount of work back then."

The LCSL III was designed for massive shore landings, known then and now as amphibious assaults.

Jack received his amphibious training at Little Creek, VA. He traveled from there to Florida as crew of the LCSL III, headed through the Panama Canal to San Diego, from there to Pearl Harbor, and on to Okinawa, Japan, where he arrived on April 1, 1945. There he was part of the Invasion of Okinawa.

Ongoing, Jack's LCSL III was often used to "skunk patrol" — looking for small Japanese boats that attacked ships in the harbor at night.

### Petty Officer 2nd Class Edward J. Cox, Sr.

Ed Cox had many interesting experiences during his years of service in the U.S. Navy. He enlisted in 1966, trained in Great Lakes, IL, and had



technical training on jet engines in "A" School at Naval Air Station Memphis. He was sent to a patrol squadron in Washington State, at Naval Air Station Whidbey Island (NASWI), in July 1967, where he was part of an air crew assigned to the Lockheed P-2 Neptune. The Lockheed P-2 Neptune was a maritime patrol and anti-submarine warfare (ASW) aircraft.

Ed was assigned to the powerplant shop and Flight Crew 9, which had 10 crew members. He was second mechanic answering to the plane captain/flight engineer.

At the end of October 1967, Ed landed at Cam Ranh Bay, Vietnam, a U.S. Air Force Base that was also a major naval base. His missions there were part of Operation Market Time, the United States Navy and South Vietnam's successful effort, begun in

attempting to infiltrate the area. Two were engaged and destroyed by Navy ships, one "blew itself up," and the fourth turned and left the area.

Ed's crew was then called to action to be part of a task force at Iwakuni, Japan, where they assisted with the search for the USS Pueblo, an intelligence-gathering ship that was attacked and captured by North Korean forces on January 23, 1968. This was later known as the Pueblo incident or alternatively, as the Pueblo crisis — the seizure of the U.S. Navy ship and her 83 crew members, one of whom was killed and 82 who were imprisoned, tortured and humiliated by their North Korean captors. North Korea claimed that the Pueblo was not in international waters but had crossed into their territorial waters. Finally, after 11 months in captivity, political negotiators settled on a release of the Pueblo crew.

The efforts to find and free the Americans who were captured on the USS Pueblo involved numerous planes of all types, loaded with weapons to retaliate. They worked around

1965, to stop the flow of troops, war material, and supplies by sea, coast, and rivers from North Vietnam into parts of South Vietnam during the Vietnam War.

Ed's crew and the P-2 were used to monitor up and down Vietnam's coastal shipping area, "looking for 100-foot fishing trawlers that were used to bring in enemy armament."

Early in March 1968, Ed's squadron was able to locate four enemy trawlers

the clock searching for submarines, pending messages that didn't happen. Ed Cox and many U.S. military servicemen were part of that effort and are to be commended.

In February 1968, Ed was promoted to an E-4 – Petty Officer 3rd Class and Machinists Mate. In May 1968 he married his high school sweetheart, Joan Estadt, and they moved to Whidbey Island, WA. While at Whidbey, the P-2 transitioned to the P-3 Orion and

Ed was sent to Moffett Field, San Francisco, for training. Ed was then stationed at Naval Air Station Barbers Point in Oahu, HI, with his wife. Their daughter Michelle was born there.

In August 1969, Ed was once again deployed to Iwakuni, Japan. In January 1970, daughter Michelle was born in Hawaii. Ed was deployed again in October 1970, so they shipped everything back to Millville — Joan and baby — where Joan's parents lived.

Ed went to the U-Tapao, Thailand AFB, where his crew did similar missions up and down the coast of Vietnam. There were 10 aircraft in his squadron.

In the middle of January 1971 Ed left the squadron for Naval Air Test Facility, Lakehurst, NJ, where he spent the next four years working on jet engines. His son Edward, Jr., was born in 1972 in Toms River. From 1971 to 1975 Ed was at Lakehurst.

Ed left the military in January 1975 — after almost eight and a half years and just prior to the end of the Vietnam War in April. Since then, Ed and his family have lived in the Millville area. Before his retirement, Ed worked for Glass Machine in Vineland, Airwork Corporation in Millville, and Durand Glass in Millville.


### Petty Officer 1st Class Edward J. Cox, Jr.

Ed's son Ed Jr. served in the U.S. Navy for nine years from 1992 to 2001. He began his career with nuclear school in Orlando, FL, for



six months, followed by another six months of prototype training in Balston Spa, NY. More education followed in nuclear welding school and machine shop training in Groton, CT. Ed Jr. was deployed several times on the USS Augusta SSN-710 submarine. He later re-wrote the quality assurance procedures for that submarine. Ed Jr. spent four years in Charleston, SC, as an instructor at nuclear school as a Petty Officer First Class.

Ed Jr. currently resides in the Millville area and is a vice president of sales for DMC Power.



### The Cox family's military service doesn't end there.

In addition to Jack, Ed and Ed Jr. there are these family members who have served: brothers-in-law Mike McNiss, U.S. Navy; Mike Stanek, U.S. Navy; Al Priest, U.S. Air Force; nephews Jon Erber, U.S. Navy, and Mike Stanek, Jr., U.S. Navy.

Such outstanding examples of military service for our country. The MAAFM is proud to honor the Cox family.

# USS LCSL III ship model on display at the Museum

World War II veteran Jack Cox hand built a model of his gun boat USS LCSL III in 1991. The model is an exact 1:48 scale replica.


Jack was a mold maker by trade and cut and carved the ship model out of a solid block of sugar pine, 4' x 8" x 8". The model was on display at the Recruitment Command Center in Great Lakes, Illinois. When the Command Center closed, the model went to the Great Lakes Museum. In recent years, the model was not displayed and Ed began contacting them to see if he could retrieve it, but was getting no response. It was not until Ed talked to Lisa Jester, executive director of the MAAFM, and Lisa reached out — museum to museum — that a plan went into motion. Lisa requested that the model come to the MAAFM where it could be displayed much closer to the Cox family. Lisa received a positive response.

April 10, 2022: Ed Sr. and Ed Jr. took a road trip to Illinois, where the model had been in storage, and picked it up. They had the original case that their father/grandfather had built to ship it in.

# MAAFM's 21st Annual Veterans Appreciation Day honored Korean War veterans and POWS

The MAAFM paid tribute to our nation's veterans on Saturday, November 5, 2022, at its 21st annual Veterans Appreciation Day at Millville Executive Airport. More than 250 veterans and visitors attended the event. The program recognized the many contributions of Korean War veterans and Prisoners of War (POWs), but honored all American veterans.

The 2022 event featured guest speaker 100-year-old Charles "Sandy" Wentzell, from Salem, NJ, a World War II veteran who later served in Korea. During WWII, Sandy was a B-17 Radio Operator who flew 30 combat missions in the 8th Air Force, including the first mission to Berlin. He was called back into service during the Korean War, serving as an observer on the ground, guiding aircraft to enemy targets. He was captured and spent time as a prisoner of war before escaping. He has been honored by the government of South Korea for his heroism.

Bob Trivellini, MAAFM vice president and master of ceremonies, introduced Barry Smith, from Millville, NJ, a dear friend of Sandy Wentzell, who told about Sandy's military career, accomplishments and sacrifices. Barry then turned the microphone to Sandy who gave first-hand accounts of his experiences.

Bob then introduced Anthony DiStefano, museum volunteer and research historian, who read the names of the 14 young airmen who perished while training at the Millville Army Air Field during WWII. Anthony did extensive research on the fallen airmen of Millville, reaching out to family members and gathering detailed information about each.

Keeping with a pre-COVID tradition, the event also featured 11 Millville High School student volunteers and four members of the Cumberland Civil Air Patrol — welcoming veterans and assisting with the day's activities. The museum was also pleased to have youth from the Cumberland County Sheriff Explorers group attend and assist.

During the 11am ceremony, museum executive director Lisa Jester presented commemorative plaques to the wives of two beloved MAAFM board members who passed away in 2021 - Paul Black-



# 2022 MAAFM Movie Night Stars

#### **Bob Leicht** ★ March 8

US Army Col. Bob Leicht (Ret.), museum member and volunteer, described the time in 2007 when he and his brothers took their father, US Army veteran Bill Leicht, back to Europe to trace the path of his unit, the 11th Armored Division, as it fought across the continent during the Battle of the Bulge. The 11th ended the war in Austria, where then-Sgt. Leicht witnessed the Mauthausen camp.





Bob Leicht answered questions regarding his trip back to Europe.

Bob's presentation was followed by the movie *The Photographer of Mauthausen*, which tells the story of one man's heroic efforts to survive in a death camp and document the horror to hold the Nazis accountable for their crimes after the war. Mauthausen was a brutal concentration camp and headquarters for the Nazi 'gulag' in Austria, which held hundreds of thousands of prisoners. It was liberated by the 11th Armored Division in May 1945.

### **George Rubin** ★ June 14

George Rubin was a B-17 armorer-waist gunner in the 8th Air Force. His plane was shot down on a mission to bomb Neuberg's marshalling yard. He survived a frightening encounter with the Hitler Youth and spent the remainder of the war in German POW camps.

John Quinesso, from Vineland, NJ, served as Radioman 2/c on the Landing Ship LSM-302 that shuttled men, tanks, aviation fuel and supplies to Pacific island battle sites during World War II. His service took him to Wake Island, Guam, Okinawa and Saipan. Aviation fuel was critical to the war effort to create and maintain functioning airstrips on the islands.

John served in the United States Navy from January 1944 to May 1946. His home base was Pearl Harbor. He had the unforgettable experience of receiving the cable that the war was over and reporting to his captain that the Japanese had surrendered.

The award is given annually to a high school student who has devoted volunteer time and effort to helping the museum achieve its mission of educating youth and preserving the history of what occurred at the Millville Army Air Field and during World War II.

Wickward was presented a certificate and given gifts by the museum at the December World War II Speaker and Movie Night event. The presenter at that event was 97-year-old veteran John Christman, of Leesburg, NJ, who was a member of the little-known Ghost Army that used elaborate deception tactics to fool the Nazis and saved many lives.

### Roland "Rocky" Gannon ★ March 9

Rocky Gannon, from Darlington, SC, and Ocean City, NJ, enlisted when he was just a 17-year-old high school junior. He soon became a B-17 pilot and flew five missions in Europe at the age of 19 just before World War II ended.

He flew combat missions in Korea, the Belgian Congo and Vietnam during his 37 years in the Air Force. During his career, he flew 34 different types of aircraft—including the C-47, DC-3, the T-6 Texan in Korea, the 0-1, 0-2, OV-10 Bronco, and the C-130 in Vietnam—totaling more than 6,000 hours.

Rocky retired from the USAF with the rank of Lieutenant Colonel.

His many awards include the Distinguished Flying Cross and Bronze Star, and he was inducted into the South Carolina Aviation Hall of Fame.

### **George Rubin** ★ June 22

George Rubin, from Medford, NJ, was a B-17 armorer-waist gunner in the 8th Air Force. On this 18th combat mission, his plane *Oh! Miss Agnes* was shot down on a mission to bomb Neuberg's marshalling yard. Prior to the plane crash lan ding, he was able to disarm its bombs and safely release them.

After the crash, he and his crew were nearly executed by members of the Hitler Youth outside of Sonthofen, Germany.

He spent the remainder of World War II in German POW camps, including Stalag Luft 13D and Moosburg.

George achieved the rank of Staff Sergeant during his service.

### **Charles "Sandy" Wentzell ★** September 14

Charles "Sandy" Wentzell, from Salem, NJ, was a B-17 Radio Operator who flew 30 combat missions with the 8th Air Force, including the first mission to Berlin.

He was called back into service during the Korean War, serving as an observer on the ground, guiding aircraft to enemy targets. He was captured and spent time as a prisoner of war before escaping.

Charles was honored by the government of South Korea for his heroism.

### **John Christman** ★ December 14

John Christman, of Leesburg, NJ, served in the US Army from March 1943 to November 1945.

He was with the 406th Combat Engineers of 23rd Headquarters Special Troops as a member of the incredible Ghost Army. They used inflatable tanks, sound effects, and extensive deception to fool the Nazis in Europe. The unit, which contained many well-known artists, deployed various theatrics to make German units think they were an entire division and

not attack or defend certain areas.

The Ghost Army is the subject of a recent book, a PBS documentary, and potentially a feature film.

John was a Private First Class who fought across Europe and ended up in Germany as the Ghost Army used their deceptive operations at the crossing of the Rhine River.

It was difficult to say goodbye to Charles "Ozzie" Osborne. He may be the last of our P-47 pilots who trained at Millville and lived near enough to be a very special part of the Millville Army Air Field Museum. Ozzie was another of those "greatest generation" heroes that our museum respects and honors. Vibrant and friendly until his passing at age 98, Ozzie has left a legacy of knowledge and experience for our members and visitors to cherish.

Ozzie felt his passion for flying at a very early age when his father, Charles Osborne, Sr., took his five-year-old son for a ride in an open cockpit biplane from the beach along the New Jersey shore. Ozzie fulfilled that passion for flying by enlisting in the US Army Air Corps in the Aviation Cadet Program in 1942. He did his basic training in Atlantic City and flight training (primary, basic, and advanced) at Buffalo University, becoming a P-47 pilot in 1944. Ozzie was assigned to train in P-47s in Camp Springs, MD, and then on to Millville to instruct new pilots.

### In Memoriam

#### Charles "Ozzie" Osborne

Died March 17, 2022, at age 98

"I was 20 years old when I started training in Millville," Ozzie reflected in an interview with Rachel Corma, MAAFM advisory board member, in 2016. "Training was fun. I learned to fly the P-47 out over the Atlantic Ocean and fire at targets. We would meet the tow plane carrying a long net to learn how to fire at a moving target. We learned to fire in front of the moving target in order to hit it. We learned to dive bomb. We had dummy bombs under the wings so we could practice diving and releasing the bombs.

"I was here at Millville for two months. Every two months a new group of pilots would come in. There were about 1,000 personnel on the field and 50 pilots. I lived in Laurel Springs, which is close to Millville, so it was a nice place to train. My dad gave me his car, so I could drive home almost every night after training, and I would come back to Millville around 2:00 each morning."

When asked about some memorable training experiences at Millville, Ozzie said, "We were coming back from a mission of firing at targets over the marshes in the Delaware Bay. We were flying low at 350 mph, and we saw guys in a boat duck hunting. By the time they heard us, we had already flown past them, but they threw up their guns and shot at our planes.

"Our instructor loved to fly low. One time he took three guys, one by one, under a bridge. The commanding officer's wife was driving over that bridge and knew to look at the numbers on the side of the planes. She told her husband what she saw and he punished the instructor. Every instructor wanted to go overseas, but the commanding officer made that instructor stay here."

Ozzie shipped out to the European Theatre in winter 1944 and flew multiple missions in Europe in the winter and spring of 1945. Their job was to support the ground troops as they advanced across Europe against Nazi Germany. First Lieutenant Charles "Ozzie" Osborne flew 26 combat missions from airstrips in Belgium, Holland and Germany in 1944 and 1945. His squadron, the 410th Fighter Squadron, received a Presidential Award for their service in 1945.

Each year on his birthday in late February, Ozzie would recall that he flew his first mission on his 21st birthday and told himself that day that he likely would never celebrate his 22nd.

How mistaken he was, as he lived to celebrate his 98th birthday a few weeks before his death.

Ozzie, the Millville Army Air Field Museum honors you and thanks you for your service during World War II, as well as for all of the wonderful first-hand historical knowledge of Millville's World War II aviation history that you shared with us and our visitors throughout the years. Our hearts are with you!

# Remembering these special individuals...



Paul M. Blackstock
Died August 18, 2021, at age 69

Paul Blackstock, from Franklinville, NJ, was a very important part of the Millville Army Air Field Museum. Paul served on the MAAFM Board of Directors since 2017, bringing a wealth of knowledge and experience on veteran programs to our museum. He was the founding president of the non-profit People for People Foundation in the greater Gloucester County area, and was very dedicated to helping veterans.

The MAAFM owes Paul Blackstock a huge a debt of gratitude on many levels, but one of the most significant was his assistance in connecting us with The Home Depot Foundation that made the restoration/renovations to one of the historic WWII buildings at Millville Executive Airport possible. The museum was notified in August 2018 that it would receive a grant designated for improvements to Building 31. The **Team Depot** project was part of the *Celebration of Service* campaign to improve the homes and lives of US military veterans and their families. Building 31 was restored and is currently being used as a maintenance and model shop for ongoing work on artifacts and displays, and for educational purposes — for veterans, students and visitors.

The MAAFM was honored to have Paul Blackstock, who was always a gentleman with a dedicated caring for veterans, as a board member, volunteer and friend.





**Jerry W. Benfer**Died December 14, 2021, at age 79

Jerry Benfer, from Upper Deerfield, NJ, served on the MAAFM board of directors for 15 years and was involved in nearly every aspect of the museum's programs and events. But what we will probably remember most was Jerry's subtle humor and ability to make us all laugh.

Jerry, a retired teacher and principal in the Bridgeton, NJ, school system, was a tremendous asset to the museum and spent countless hours volunteering his time and talent.

Some of Jerry's many contributions to the museum included being the Wyble Library Director, Millville Airshow Volunteer Coordinator, Thunderbolts Advocates treasurer and secretary, and Movie Night director (choosing appropriate movies to match up with our veteran speaker of the night and handling technical details), running our bus trips for many years, working in our library and education center, being captain of airshow volunteers, serving as racetrack box coordination for airshow track shutdowns and serving as chairman of the museum by-laws committee, among many others.

The MAAFM is so thankful to have had Jerry Benfer as part of its every mission for so many years, and is grateful to his wife, Rita, for sharing him with us. He is truly missed.



# In Memoriam

### Walter "Loggie" S. Kocielski

Died January 12, 2022, at age 95

The MAAFM lost another good friend and WorldWar II veteran in 2022. Walter Kocielski, from Millville, NJ, was a longtime museum member and volunteer who offered his extensive knowledge, positive good-natured outlook, and many very compelling stories about his experiences on the beach at Iwo Jima during the war.

Walt joined the US Marine Corps in 1944. He valiantly served our country in the 4th Marine Division, 25th Regiment, 3rd Battalion, I Company, 1st Platoon, quickly achieving the rank of Corporal at the young age of 18.

At the height of WWII, Walt was deployed to Iwo Jima, in the Pacific Theatre, where he was involved in some of the fiercest battles of the war. Walter's experience at Iwo Jima at age 19 was one that would rattle any man. His division arrived at the beach on the island by amphibious craft on February 19, 1945, where the battle was already in progress. He was fortunate just to make it to a foxhole alive during the first day, as Japanese were shooting knee mortars (phosphorus grenades that were shot from tubes on the ground). By evening, as they were setting up defenses, they were pinned down by machine guns. It took five days to advance 500 yards. During those five days Walter lost many buddies who were serving right alongside of him. The stories were too sad and too scary for him to recall without becoming emotional.

Of the 56 men in Walter's unit who landed on the beach that day, only six survived the first week. Walt was very fortunate to be one of them.

Several months later, Walt was about to be deployed to Japan, but when the bombs were dropped in August 1945 he was told that he could go home.

Walt never spoke about the war, battle, or life itself to promote himself; he would instead tearfully and humbly express how grateful he was to have survived and that he was able to come home and live his life with his family and friends.

Sometimes, Walt would repeat his war experience, and everyone would always listen with respect and awe as if they were hearing it for the first time. This proud veteran reliving the intense battle with vivid descriptions and emotions was truly a sight to see. The sorrow that he felt when he talked of his fellow Marines that he was friends with and then witness their tragic death would leave his captive audience speechless every time.

One of Walt's favorite sayings was "I had a foxhole buddy who was with me in battle. His name was Jesus." During the height of the battle, Walt prayed and asked the Lord to wake up his parents back home and have them pray for him. In the middle of that night in their house on Fairton Road in Millville, his mother woke up and then woke her husband up and they began to pray for him. Walt's stories of survival and love for Jesus have inspired many people over the years.

Walt was a lifelong resident of Millville. Sadly, Walt's wife Doris passed a few months after Walter on March 5, 2022, at the age of 89. They had been married nearly 70 years.

### In Memoriam

#### **Ron Frantz**

Died September 6, 2022, at age 90

The MAAFM was sad to learn about the passing of museum member and volunteer Ron Frantz. A lifelong resident of Millville, NJ, Ron served in the US Army from 1951 to 1959 during the Cold War era and was stationed in Germany.

Ron devoted many volunteer hours to our museum with special focus on the preservation and promotion of one of our most valuable assets — the Link Trainer flight simulator, located in the original WWII Link Trainer Building within the historic complex at Millville Executive Airport.

For many years, Ron Frantz was the museum's director of the Link, providing countless hours for its maintenance and display, and giving many tours to visitors. The museum acquired this Link in 2002, and Ron, a retired electrician, helped restore it. The restoration took about two years to complete and Ron knew the Link from the inside out. We are indebted to Ron for his dedicated contribution of time and talent.

Died December 24, 2021, at age 92

George Mitchell, from Millville, NJ, joined the US Navy at the age of 18 where he studied electronics and served as a radioman for a blimp squadron that was used to monitor submarine activities off the west coast of the United States during the Cold War. He was also



a crew member on the world record blimp endurance flight in 1954. He served several years at the Naval Station in Key West, FL.
